SUBJECT: Report of City Council Committees' Activities

INTRODUCTION

A brief update is provided for City Council review on the activities of the following standing committees: Economic Development Committee, Park Development Committee, and Water Resources Committee.

STATEMENT OF FACT

On October 29, the Economic Development Committee met and discussed:

A review of completed and current commercial developments in 2019 was presented. Staff provided a summary/update for each commercial development and handed out a spreadsheet identifying the project valuation and total number of employees estimated for each project. In addition, staff discussed potential development projects for the upcoming year. Most notable amongst these were the Timmons Subaru dealership, the 24-unit apartments on Elaine Avenue, and the initial planning of the former Boeing property by Goodman.

On October 29, the Park Development Committee met and discussed six reports as follows:

- Review of Prospective Tenant for Burns Community Center Following direction from the city council at the October 8, 2019 study session, staff provided a report to the committee for prospective tenant, Refresh Youth Center. The Park Development Committee directed staff to draft a lease agreement for a one (1) year term with Refresh Youth Center to be presented for approval at the November 12, 2019 regular meeting of the Lakewood City Council.
- Older Adult Volunteer of the Year Nomination Process Historically, the Older Adult Volunteer of the Year nomination standards have required the individual winning the award to be a Lakewood resident. Staff provided examples of older adult volunteers who have generously volunteered at an above-and-beyond level as compared to their counterparts, yet don't live in Lakewood, and would otherwise would be worthy of receiving the Adult Volunteer of the Year award. An example is a Lakewood Meals On Wheels volunteer who happens to not be a Lakewood resident who donates upwards of 2,000 hours annually, fare in excess of her Lakewood resident counterpart. The committee directed staff to amend the standards and allow for non-residents to earn this recognition as voted on by the selection committee.
- Lakewood Youth Sports Coach's Recognition Program The LYS coach's recognition program is a three-tiered awards program, recognizing only head coaches for seasons of services as follows:
 - a) Citation 7 seasons of service

- b) Merit 12 seasons of service
- c) Mayor's 18 seasons of service

Coaches are awarded plaques for the Citation and Merit levels at Lakewood Celebrates, while Mayor's Award winners are inducted into the Lakewood Youth Hall of Fame and given the traditional personalized jacket. When the awards program was developed, assistant coaches did not receive credit for seasons of service with regard to the recognition levels, largely due to a lesser role as a coach. With the development of many legal requirements (e.g. Live Scan background checks, head injury training and the Safe Sport Act) as well as a lengthy training program developed by staff, assistant coaches now have a similar level of commitment.

The committee directed staff to extend the coach's recognition program to include assistant coaches commensurate to head coaches and to review coaches currently volunteering in the program to identify service milestones, but no lookback to volunteers whom are no longer active.

- on Site Cooking for Private Rentals of Recreation Facilities In 2004 the city council passed an ordinance making the use of portable barbecues and other cooking devices illegal on park premises in Lakewood. The ordinance was initiated in an effort to maintain safety at park facilities, while also maintaining open space at parks to be used by the public as intended. In recent years, taco cart style caterers have become a popular outlet for parties at both public and private facilities. Staff conducted a survey of 23 surrounding cities to determine their policies with regard to taco cart caterers and other on-site cooking outlets. The survey demonstrated that 21 of 23 cities allowed on site catering of some kind, but nearly all cities had restrictions to accompany such permits. Restrictions included insurance, additional fees, business licenses and specific areas to which catering was restricted. Staff identified for the committee a list of Lakewood Facilities at which taco cart catering could take place both safely and secluded to maintain a level of privacy exclusive to the facility permit if the ordinance were to be amended. The Committee asked questions and weighed the pros and cons of on-site cooking at specified facilities, but deferred making a decision until a later date, when the potential impact of the new street vendor law can be assessed.
- Facility Rental Insurance Community Rooms The City's 2017 risk management evaluation by the California Joint Powers Insurance Authority recommended that Lakewood include general liability insurance to be held by permit holders. In response, Staff conducted a survey of 20 surrounding cities, querying what requirements they hold for facility permits with regard to general liability insurance. While specifics varied, 18 of the cities required some level of insurance from permit holders. Research demonstrated that insurance costs would range from \$90 to \$250 to be passed along to facility permit applicants. With the cost analysis and fee allocation study currently being conducted, there is a possibility that facility permit costs may adjust in the near future. Due to this possibility, no recommendation was made and no direction was given to staff.

On November 5, 2019, the Water Resources Committee met and discussed:

• The urgency of needed repairs to the filter underdrain of Treatment Plant 27 that provides required treatment for the city's largest production well (2,300 gpm) - Well #27 at the Arbor Yard.

- An update was provided on the Capital Improvement Program (CIP). The focus was on newly available knowledge, tools, and perspectives on distribution pipeline replacement, which is the single largest long-term CIP budget item. The new approach may include various source control measures and more accurate assessments that have the potential to reduce the CIP pipeline budget.
- The Water Fund Finance Report Update was tabled for a later Committee meeting discussion in January 2020.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council receive and file this report.

SUBJECT: Informing the Public about the March 3, 2020 General Municipal Election

INTRODUCTION

At the November 12 City Council meeting, staff indicated that a program would be developed to provide the public with information pertaining to the upcoming March 2020 municipal election, and that the program would include a multi-disciplinary approach including direct mail, electronic media and the display of information on the City's website, social media and CityTV.

In addition, Los Angeles County will be implementing a new voting system for the March 2020 election countywide that will include a new format of ballot, touch-screen system for voting, new polling locations, and longer polling hours, including one or more locations in Lakewood that are open for up to 10 days prior to election day. Lakewood's March 2020 Municipal Election will incorporate all of these changes, and thus there will be significant new polling information for residents to learn in order to participate in the March 2020 Lakewood Municipal Election.

STATEMENT OF FACT

Staff has developed a program to educate and inform Lakewood residents on the 2020 Municipal Election, and staff believes that adding education and information about the new voting methods, locations and hours of operation in Lakewood is appropriate in order to help residents participate in the election. As indicated in the November 12 staff report, the information program would include direct mail, electronic media and the display of information on the City's website, social media and CityTV.

The cost of this program of public information would be \$113,000, which would include a contract not to exceed \$30,000 with the city's existing contract printing company for the printing of direct mail newsletters; \$24,000 for the city's postage account to pay for the delivery of the newsletters; and a contract not to exceed \$59,000 with an electronic media information firm.

It is important to note that this program covers education and information about the municipal election and new county voting process; it does not and legally cannot cover advocacy for or against any measure or item on the ballot.

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RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council authorize the Mayor to execute a contract with Trend Offset Printing Co., subject to approval as to legal form by the City Attorney, in an amount not to exceed \$30,000; that the City Council authorize the Mayor to execute a contract with DSP Inc., subject to approval as to legal form by the City Attorney, in an amount not to exceed \$59,000; that the City Council authorize the transfer of up to \$24,000 to the city's postage account; and that those funds be appropriated from the General Fund.

SUBJECT: Lakewood State Legislative Bill Positions and Final Outcomes in 2019

INTRODUCTION

With direction and guidance from the 2019 Legislative Platform, the City of Lakewood took a position on 16 pieces of legislation in the 2019 State Legislative Session.

Of the 5 bills the City supported:

- 2 were enacted and will become State law;
- 2 were adopted by the State Legislature but vetoed by the Governor; and.
- 1 failed passage in the State Legislature

Of the 11 bills the City opposed;

- 6 were enacted and will become State law; and,
- 5 failed passage in the State Legislature

It is important to note that even though bills may have failed passage, the Legislature will be entering the second year of a two-year legislative session, therefore bills that have failed can be made into two-year bills.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

A description of each bill, the City's position and its outcome in 2019 is below.

Land Use and Housing

Opposition to AB 68 (Ting). AB 68 circumvents local ordinances that may exclude ADUs for criteria based on health and safety. This measure would allow for up to two new-construction ADUs on a parcel with a multifamily dwelling, unlimited ADUs converted from existing space with a multifamily building, a new-construction ADU on a parcel with a single family home, and conversions of existing space to create an ADU and Junior Accessory Dwelling Unit (JADU) within a single family home or associated accessory structure would have to be allowed on any residential or mixed use parcel. This measure would also further restrict the parking requirements or an ADU. When a garage, carport, or covered parking structure is demolished or converted into an ADU, AB 68 would prohibit a city from requiring replacement parking. This would only exacerbate existing parking conflicts because we are currently prohibited from imposing parking requirements on new ADUs if they are within one-half mile of transit. *The bill was signed by the Governor into law*.

Opposition to AB 881 (Bloom). The City objects to the provision in AB 881 that would prohibit us from requiring a property owner live in the main house or one of the accessory structures until January 1, 2025. This would incentivize operating the property as a commercial enterprise and could have the unintended effect of large-scale investors purchasing many single-family homes and adding ADUs, thus operating more like a property management company, not a homeowner seeking some additional income. *The bill was signed by the Governor into law.*

Opposition for AB 1763 (Chiu). This bill which would greatly expand existing Density Bonus Law (DBL) to require a city to award a developer significantly more density, additional concessions and incentives, and greater allowable height if 100% of the units are restricted to lower income households. This bill would allow for unlimited density and up to three additional stories for developments within one-half mile of a "major transit stop." This increase in allowable height and density would be too extreme for our community and would likely undermine our state certified housing element and community-based housing plans. *The bill was signed by the Governor into law*.

Opposition to SB 13 (Wieckowski). This bill arbitrarily caps impact fees that can be imposed on ADUs, prohibits replacement parking and prohibits owner occupancy requirements. *The bill was signed by the Governor into law.*

Opposition to SB 50 (Wiener). This bill would exempt certain housing projects from locally developed and adopted height limitations, densities, parking requirements, and design review standards. This legislation proposed to require local governments to provide developers with incentives for constructing residential developments in job-rich and transit-rich areas and include significant exceptions to local planning requirements. The City expects this topic to resurface in the 2020 Legislative Session. *The bill failed passage in the Senate and was made into a two-year bill.*

Opposition to SB 330 (Skinner). The City opposes the bill due to three main reasons: It creates a new type of housing project application that limits the number of public hearings, freezes nearly all project related fees and starts the approval timeline before an application is deemed complete. The bill also freezes impact fees for up to 2 1/2 years and essentially bans project specific fees. Lakewood strongly questions the effectiveness of restricting essential housing related fees, particularly when SB 330 does not require any of the cost savings associated with these limitations to be passed on to the renter or purchaser of the housing unit. *The bill was signed by the Governor into law.*

Economic Development

Support for SB 5 (Beall/McGuire). Essentially Redevelopment 2.0. SB 5 would create a new local-State partnership to provide up to \$2 billion annually to fund State approved affordable housing, infrastructure, and economic development projects that also support State policies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, expand transit oriented development (TOD), address poverty, and revitalize neighborhoods. *The bill was vetoed by the Governor*.

Cannabis

Opposition for AB 1356 (Ting). Under this bill, if more than 50 percent of the voters of a local jurisdiction voted in favor of Proposition 64, these local jurisdictions would be required to issue a minimum number of licenses authorizing retail cannabis activity within that jurisdiction. More specifically, the bill requires these cities to issue a minimum of one retail cannabis license for every four liquor licenses, or one retail cannabis license for every 10,000 residents. We oppose this bill because existing law, under both the Medicinal and Adult-Use Cannabis Regulation and Safety Act (MAUCRSA) and Proposition 64, states that local jurisdictions have the ability to adopt and enforce local ordinances to regulate cannabis businesses. *The bill was held in the Assembly*.

Local Government Finance

Opposition to AB 1208 (Ting). This bill would extend the sunset date on the prohibition on local jurisdictions to impose a utility users tax (UUT) on clean electricity from January 1, 2020 to January 1, 2027. In simplest terms, the bill would grant a tax exemption to consumption of electricity generated by means of solar panels or photovoltaic cells. We oppose the bill because as renewable energy types such as residential and commercial solar increase, cities with UUTs will experience a corresponding reduction in UUT revenues. *The bill was signed by the Governor into law*.

Opposition to SB 266 (Leyva). SB 266 would require public agencies to directly pay retirees and/or their beneficiaries, disallowed retirement benefits using general fund dollars. The city's objections to this measure are rooted in policy, operational cost, and legal concerns. *The bill failed passage in the Senate and was made into a two-year bill.*

Support for SB 344 (McGuire). This bill would provide a one-year sunset extension, from January 1, 2020 to January 1, 2021, for the point-of-sale collection mechanism for Utility User Taxes (UUTs) imposed on prepaid wireless service. AB 1717 (2014) set up this collection mechanism, similar to sales tax, where the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (CDTFA) collects our voter-approved locally imposed UUT from retail sales of prepaid wireless telecommunication products and services and distributes those revenues to our community and the other 103 local agencies that participate in the program. *The bill was signed by the Governor into law*.

Support for SB 531 (Glazer). This bill would prospectively ban sales tax rebate agreements between a retailer and a local agency involving Bradley-Burns Sales and Use Taxes in exchange for the retailer locating or continuing to maintain a place of sale to generate (and rebate) revenue from the sales of tangible property delivered to, and received by, the purchaser in the territorial jurisdiction of another city or county. Lakewood believes that these practices ultimately promote a race to the bottom that ends up harming all cities. *The bill was vetoed by the Governor*.

Opposition to SB 732 (Allen). SB 732 would allow the South Coast Air Quality Management District to impose, increase, or extend a transactions and use tax in increments of .25%., up to a total of 1%, that exceeds the 2% cap. While Los Angeles County ranks among the top three worst counties in smog and particulate levels in the country and that the intent of this bill is to improve air quality and public health in our communities, the City disagrees that the solution to improving air quality and meeting federal clean air deadlines is through the creation of a transactions and use tax in the four counties of the SCAQMD. The bill failed passage in the Senate and was made a two-year bill.

Water

Support for AB 1220 (Garcia). This bill would preserve our region's representation on the Board of the Directors for the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD). The City supports this bill because it would protect our region's voice by ensuring that the Central Basin Municipal Water District does not lose a seat on the MWD Board of Directors. *The bill was signed by the Governor into law*.

Support for SB 669 (Caballero). This bill would create the Safe Drinking Water Trust (Trust) at the state Treasury. The purpose of the Trust would be to provide a durable funding source to help community water systems in disadvantaged communities provide their customers with access to safe drinking water. The Trust is a better approach than a statewide water tax. *The bill was held in the Senate*.

Local Control

Opposition to AB 516 (Chiu). We oppose the bill because it would eliminate enforcement tools for cities to address motorists who disregard basic laws designed to benefit entire communities. Specifically, the measure would eliminate the ability for cities to "immobilize," or place a boot on a vehicle, for motorists who have five or more unpaid parking tickets; remove vehicles with expired registration that are operating illegally; and remove vehicles in violation of parking time restrictions. AB 516 will exacerbate parking scarcity by creating an environment extremely vulnerable for exploitation with consequences much more serious than the problem the bill is trying to solve. The bill failed passage in the Assembly and was made into a two-year bill.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council receive and file this report.

SUBJECT: Approval of Agreement for Water Utility Services

BACKGROUND

On Friday, November 8, 2019, the City of Lakewood was informed via email that its current water billing services vendor, Fathom, would no longer be providing service to its clients and would cease operations on November 30, 2019. Fathom subsequently held a conference call attended by its clients on Tuesday, November 12, 2019, to discuss their abrupt decision and intent to cease operations, as well as to introduce a potential interim transitional and long-term solution that could ensure continuity of service to their customers, including the City. The proposed solution involves contracting with an alternate service provider, Vertex Data Utility Services, LLC (Vertex), which has indicated it has obtained the sole rights to utilize Fathom's existing software and billing platform to ensure no interruption in services to customers for a fixed period of time. Vertex would then begin implementation of a project to migrate the City from Fathom's systems onto the VertexOne platform.

Over the last week and half, staff has been working diligently to research the viability of the proposed solution and the wherewithal of the vendor (Vertex), as well as explore any other viable options. As of this writing and the posting of the agenda, we are close to making a recommendation. It is our intention to provide a more detailed report, inclusive of a specific recommendation on Monday, November 25.

RECOMMENDATION

Approval of agreement for water utility services.
